It was Simon's idea! - Category 2 - Subcategory speaking evil

Simon touches the machine: Look nothing happens. Let us assist Mum. They put the flour in the bowl, the eggs they break, the milk and butter they put in. Now that everything is in there anyway, we might as well put it on, what could go wrong? Put it on Daan, you're big enough to plug it in. Daan does it and then...the machine starts running...and all the ingredients fly through the kitchen Mum walks in and notices Daan standing near the machine: 'What have you done, Daan? It was all Simon's idea, explains Daan.

Was Daan fair in blaming Simon?
